## **Executive Director's Message**

Our Winter Meeting held on Thursday, February 26, 2009 was very successful with approximately 70 attendees. The theme was “Wetlands—The Status of Wetlands Delineation and Assessment in New England.” Experts throughout the region addressed various facets on the theme. I have received many emails and a few phone calls on how well the conference went.

As part of our effort to provide professional development:

10 individuals attended a CPESC review session held in January from Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, and Vermont.

15 individuals from the same states took CPESC/CESSWI/CPSWQ exams in February.

Currently 12 individuals from the same states are registered to take CPESC/CESSWI/CPSWQ exams on April 24<sup>th</sup>.

CPESC on June 29, and  
CPSWQ on September 18, 2009.

## **RI Director to Submit Poster to SWCS 2009 National Meeting**

The SNEC SWCS RI Director has been selected as the delegate for the 2009 SWCS national meeting in Dearborn, Michigan. She will be presenting a poster titled "Are We Fooling Ourselves? Eelgrass and Subaqueous Soils as a Refuge for Fecal Indicator Bacteria". In October 2008 a partnership was forged between the Natural Resources Conservation Service and the University of Rhode Island to complete the study.

The study was conducted to determine if fecal indicator bacteria can utilize eelgrass and subaqueous soils to persist in water systems. Fecal indicator bacteria are harmless bacteria that are found with pathogenic bacteria. Fecal indicator bacteria are easy and cheap to detect and die soon after entering a water body, allowing for their presence to be related to a specific contamination event. Therefore, if fecal indicator bacteria were able to persist in water systems it could lead to false positives for fecal contamination in coastal waters. The presence of fecal indicator bacteria causes beach closures as determined by the EPA. Beach closures can cost a coastal community upwards of \$37,000 per closure.

Bluff Hill Cove in Point Judith, Rhode Island was the study location. Subaqueous soil and eelgrass samples were collected. Each sample was analyzed for Fecal enterococci and *Bifidobacterium adolescentis*. Fecal enterococci was analyzed because the EPA has suggested that it is the best indicator of human health risk in salt water used for recreation and shell-fishing activities. *Bifidobacterium adolescentis* exists only in the human system. Nucleic acid analysis of *Bifidobacterium adolescentis* was completed. If *Bifidobacterium adolescentis* were present in the sample then the fecal contamination would have been from human sources.

FE were present in both the eelgrass and subaqueous soil samples, with a higher concentration found in the latter. By contrast, *B. adolescentis* was not detected in either soil or eelgrass samples. These results suggest that FE bacteria may not be a reliable indicator of recent human fecal contamination, since soil and plants both appear to serve as refuge for these organisms in coastal environments, and thus a potential source of these bacteria to the water column. This information warrants a reanalysis of Fecal enterococci as an indicator of pathogenic bacteria.

## **2009 SNEC SWCS Summer Meeting!**

Come join us on Thursday June 18th for a boat tour and clambake in southern Rhode Island!
